Meningitis: a medical emergency

Did you know?

Meningitis is the swelling of the lining around the brain and spinal cord (the meninges).

It is usually caused by a bacterial, fungal or viral infection.



There are around 2.3 million cases

of meningitis worldwide every year.

Tragically, around 40% of all deaths from meningitis are in children under five.

*All statistics correct as of January 2025.



1 in 5 survivors

of bacterial meningitis will live with life-long disabilities.

World Meningitis Day Raising awareness to drive change

In 2009, our international member network, the Confederation of Meningitis Organisations (CoMO), founded World Meningitis Day to bring together a global community of people affected by meningitis. Over time it has grown – expanding its reach and impact to become the world's largest day of collective action on meningitis. Co-ordinated by Meningitis Research Foundation, World Meningitis Day is a crucial opportunity to raise awareness and advocate for change to save lives.







World Meningitis Day awareness activities organised by CoMO members include a doorstep awareness-raising initiative in Pakistan and discussions with staff and patients at Kenya's largest children's hospital. In the UK, Meningitis Research Foundation staff helped to light the road.

Defeating meningitis by 2030

Working towards a milestone in the World Health Organization's Global Road Map

Meningitis is a largely preventable disease that impacts millions worldwide.

World Meningitis Day provides a crucial platform to raise awareness and mobilise action and support from funders and policymakers. Its importance has been recognised by its inclusion in the World Health Organization's (WHO) Global Road Map to Defeat Meningitis by 2030 – the first-ever global plan to defeat meningitis.

One of the key milestones outlined in the Road Map is to ensure the participation of at least 80% of member states on World Meningitis Day, which takes place on 5th October.

In 2024, 135 countries – over two-thirds of WHO member states – participated in World Meningitis Day, moving us closer to our target and **making it the biggest year to date.**

Together, we can defeat meningitis.

CoMO members pioneer the very first World Meningitis Day with members undertaking activities in 19 countries.



2020

The WHO's Global **Road Map to Defeat** Meningitis by 2030 is approved by the World Health Assembly.

2015

Meningitis Research Foundation begin work with the World Health Organization (WHO) to support the development of a global "road map" to defeat meningitis, raising funds and supporting the first multilateral meeting.

2021

Momentum for World Meningitis Day builds, with 48 countries participating.

CoMO becomes a part of Meningitis **Research Foundation** creating the world's leading meningitis charity.

The WHO launches the Global Road Map. the first plan to defeat meningitis. Meningitis Research Foundation sit on the WHO-led implementation taskforce and are the only members whose sole focus is meningitis.

2022

Meningitis Research Foundation becomes the co-ordinator of World Meningitis Day, working with CoMO members across the world.

2023

The number of countries participating in World Meningitis Day continues to grow, with **126 countries** taking action on the day.


2024

The WHO publishes its investment case for the Global Road Map to Defeat Meningitis by 2030, highlighting the need for \$37.5 million for advocacy and engagement.

> Funded by Meningitis Research Foundation, CoMO launches the **very first advocacy fund for World Meningitis Day** to help members do more than ever before.

135 countries participate in World Meningitis Day – more than two-thirds of WHO member states – making 2024 the most successful year to date.

Sharing stories to save lives

Sharing meningitis experiences can change lives. Every year, people share their stories to raise awareness and foster a greater understanding of this complex and potentially deadly disease.

We want to collect 2,030 stories for 2030 in support of the Global Road Map.

By creating the world's largest digital collection of meningitis experiences, we aim to help global leaders understand its true impact and connect those affected, ensuring no one ever feels alone.

Spreading life-saving awareness

From campaign messaging, logos and email banners to social media resources and printables – people all over the world took advantage of **more than 200 free resources in four different languages in our campaign toolkit**. Together, they helped make others aware of the threat and drew global attention to the need to defeat meningitis, so future generations are protected.

Empowering change with the campaign toolkit:

Free resources downloaded over 21,000 times in 100 countries.

Now used to raise awareness by advocates all year round.

2024 was the most successful toolkit to date:

Almost a **30% increase** in the number of countries using the toolkit.

More than double the number of downloads in comparison to 2023. One minute you're working doing your normal things, within less than 24 hours you're fighting for your life.


Lighting the road ahead

On World Meningitis Day, people all over the world came together at 20:30 (8:30pm) to light up the night in remembrance of those whose lives have been affected by meningitis. We stood united in hope for a future where this disease is defeated.

This year, the response was extraordinary – with support from global health organisations, governments and international institutions including the World Health Organization, the United Nations, the NHS, the French Ministry of Health, Médecins Sans Frontières, MSD, the Spanish Senate, Nigeria Rivers State Ministry of Health, Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, UNICEF, Sanofi, PATH, London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, GSK and the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention.

Supporting civil society across the world

The Confederation of Meningitis Organisations (CoMO) is the civil society network arm of Meningitis Research Foundation.

We support our members all over the world by equipping them with the most effective tools and evidence for campaigning and advocacy, fostering collaboration and inspiring change.

- 90% of members said
 World Meningitis Day
 helped them to get people
 talking about meningitis.
- 84% said it increased awareness of meningitis issues in their country.
- 74% said it made them feel part of a global community.

76 CoMO members in 37 countries made their voices heard on World Meningitis Day – a 52% increase in member engagement and a 28% increase in country participation In 2024, our CoMO members did more than ever before.

A meningitis documentary

The Spanish Association Against Meningitis produced a documentary about a meningitis outbreak in Galicia 50 years ago, highlighting its transformation into a region with the best vaccination program in Spain, coinciding with a new €3 million investment in MenB vaccines.

Awareness-raising at a children's hospital in Kenya

The Meningitis Awareness Foundation collaborated with Kenya's largest children's hospital to host a meningitis awareness week, featuring a keynote presentation attended by over 150 staff and nursing students, highlighting the importance of professional development on meningitis.

The first national plan to defeat meningitis in the Americas

The Brazilian government launched its first national strategic plan to combat meningitis in the Americas. A celebratory event on October 3rd featured WHO representatives and a compelling speech from Suelen Caroline Rosalino, President of the Brazilian Association for the Fight against Meningitis, who shared her family's experiences with the disease.







Investing in advocacy to drive change



We invested **£20,000 in global advocacy projects** with the launch of our **first-ever World Meningitis Day Advocacy Fund**. Funding supported six innovative CoMO member projects to broaden their reach and amplify their impact.

Ghana

Concern Health Education Project launched a national expert committee on meningitis, uniting health experts, NGO representatives and those affected.

Announced in partnership with the Ghanaian Ministry of Health, they reached millions through powerful radio broadcasts, boosting awareness nationwide.



al Côte d'Ivoire The Centre Suisse de

The Centre Suisse de Recherches Scientifiques organised screenings of a compelling seven-part animation they had created about a young meningitis survivor.

Held at schools, and at a panel event for 140 people including government representatives and health professionals, the viewings raised awareness about the realities of meningitis in Côte d'Ivoire.


Advocacy Fund



Japan

The Japan Child Meningitis Organisation lit up the iconic Osaka Castle. They also engaged students at a local school in a lantern-making workshop. Uniting as a community, families affected by meningitis joined them to carry the lanterns around a rooftop track in a symbolic display of remembrance and hope. Their efforts to raise awareness were highlighted in a news segment on a regional television station.









Nigeria

Care and Development Centre (CADEC) trained 22 Community Health Extension Workers and eight Surveillance Officers to raise awareness about meningitis within their communities and improve detection and referral rates.

CADEC also shared crucial messages at marketplaces and supported a survivor's mother to tell her story on Nigerian local radio.

Tanzania

Dr. Spensa'r Fulgence hosted a series of awarenessraising events at hospitals and schools. These reached more than 4,000 people including parents, journalists, council commissioners, healthcare professionals and meningitis survivors.

Promoted through local radio and press releases, these events fostered important community discussions on meningitis awareness.





USA

Meningitis survivor John B. Grimes hosted a golf tournament to raise awareness of meningitis.

There were moving speeches and twelve stories of those affected displayed at the players' bays. These engaged participants on a personal level and highlighted the impact of the disease.

Making an impact World Meningitis Day 2024 in numbers



135 countries took action on **World Meningitis Day**.

100 countries

downloaded the **World Meningitis Day toolkit**, with its free resources on all aspects of meningitis awareness and prevention. What are the symptoms of meningitis and sepsis? Meningitis and sepsis are very serious infections which can kill in hours. Knowing the symptoms could save someone's life.




